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RE: 2013-2014 CSU and UC transfer numbers

Overview

The California State University Chancellor's Office and the University of California Office of the President released the numbers of community college transfers to the CSU and UC systems for 2013-14.

Some highlights:

- The transfer rate to the CSU system increased between 2012-13 and 2013-14 by 9%.
- The transfer rate to the UC system increased between 2012-13 and 2013-14 by 4%.
- The largest number of CSU transfers enrolled at San Jose State University (159), San Francisco State University (89) and Cal State East Bay (43). Out of these three institutions, only San Jose State University experienced a decline in the number of Foothill transfer students from 2012-13 and 2013-14.
- White students represent just under one-third of those enrolling in the CSU system in 2013-14 (32%), while Asian and Latino students each represent almost one-fifth of all CSU transfer students (15% Asian; 19% Latino).
- The acceptance rate to the UC system in 2013-14 is 73%.
- The largest number of UC transfers in 2013-14 enrolled at UC Davis (113), UC San Diego (82) and UC Los Angeles (77). All three of these three institutions experienced an increase in the number of Foothill transfer students from 2012-13 and 2013-14.
- UC Riverside experienced the largest percentage rate increase in the number of transfer students between 2012-13 and 2013-14 (3 to 12 students).
- Compared to neighboring community colleges, Foothill transferred fewer numbers of students to the CSUs but a greater number to the UC system (except for De Anza).

In the past academic year, 382 Foothill students transferred to a CSU while 429 transferred to an UC institution. While the UC transfer numbers continue to be on an increasing trend since 2010-11, the CSU transfer numbers saw a decrease between 2010-2011 and 2011-2012; however, there has been an increasing trend since 2011-12. (Table 1). As noted earlier, the changes in the annual CSU transfer rate may be partially explained by the revisions to San Jose State University’s local area guarantee and the CSU system not accepting any mid-year transfers.

Out of the 382 students transferring to a CSU institution, the largest representation was at San Jose State University (159), followed by San Francisco State (89) and Cal State East Bay (43). Cal State Chico (16) and Cal State Long Beach (14) represent the remaining top five CSU transfer destinations among Foothill students. Compared to 2013-14, the number of transfer students to these five institutions increased, with Cal State Chico replacing Cal State Fullerton as a top five CSU destination. Foothill continues to increase the number of transfer students enrolling at Cal State Humboldt, Cal State Monterey Bay, Cal State Northridge, Cal State Sacramento, and Cal Poly SLO (Table 2).

Compared to 2012-13, Foothill transferred a higher number of students from all ethnic backgrounds, except for White students (-1%) and for Non-Resident Aliens (-9%). White students continue to represent the largest percentage among transferring students (32%) (note this percentage continues to decline from year to year), with Latinos at 19% and Asians at 15% (Table 3).

In 2013-14, there were 757 Foothill College applicants to the University of California system, with 555 applicants being admitted, yielding a final enrollment of 429 (Table 4). There was a 73% acceptance rate with just over three-quarters of those admits enrolling at an UC campus. The number of applications increased from 2012-13 by 3% (733 to 757).

Table 5 shows the UC institutions where Foothill students transferred. UC Davis enrolled the greatest number (113), representing 26% of Foothill students transferring to the UC system. Along with UC Davis, UC San Diego (82), UC Berkeley (73) and UCLA (77) represent the top UC transfer destinations.

Comparisons with Other Community Colleges

Here are the 2013-14 California State University and University of California transfer numbers from Foothill College along with some of the neighboring colleges. Compared to some these other institutions, Foothill transferred fewer numbers of students to the CSUs but a greater number to the UC system (Tables 6 & 8).

Among the CSU transfer students, these institutions sent the majority of their students to San Jose State University, San Francisco State University, and Cal State East Bay. Due to proximity and its feeder school relationships, over half of the CSU transfers from College of San Mateo and Skyline College enrolled at San Francisco State University (60% and 69%, respectively). At De Anza College, the majority of CSU transfers enrolled at San Jose State University (58%). Evergreen College, San Jose City College and Mission College also had a majority of its CSU transfer students attending San Jose State University (67%, 66% and 63%, respectively).

Table 7 shows a comparison of CSU transfer students from neighboring community colleges disaggregated by ethnicity. As a reflection of the diversity in the region, most of these institutions had about one-third or less of its CSU transfer cohort composed of White students. West Valley was the exception with Whites making up 52% of its CSU transfer students.

Table 9 provides information regarding students who transferred to non-CSU or UC institutions, including the in-state privates and out-of-state transfers. Both institution types are enrolling more students annually; this increasing trend appears much stronger among out-of-state college and universities.

Methodology

The transfer rate for 2013-14 is for the full academic year. In 2011-12, CSU did not admit any spring semester transfers. Note that 2012-13 is the first time the UC Office of the President released any data regarding ethnicity of transfers by community college. Additionally, 2013-14 transfer data for In-State-Private and Out-of-State institutions is not yet available, so report shows data through 2012-13 for these institutions.
