Student Population

International Students (F1)

- Enrollment among F1 students increased from Fall 2013 to Fall 2014 by 6%, from 1,131 to 1,203.
- o Females represented 41% of all international students (F1 and FZ visa status) in Fall 2013 compared to 39% in Fall 2014.
- o In Fall 2013 and Fall 2014, the top three countries of origin for international students included China (F13: 328 vs. F14: 371), Hong Kong (F13: 189 vs. F14: 143) and Indonesia (F13: 149 vs. F14: 139).

Applicants who Registered in Fall 2014

- o About one-quarter of the applicants who registered reported that they were never involved in activities that served their community in the past year (24%).
- o About half of the applicants who registered reported that their family income over the past year was \$50,000 or less (51%).
- o Slightly under half of the applicants who registered reported that they spoke another language other than English at home (47%). The top five languages include Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Russian, and Farsi.
- o Almost half of the Fall 2014 applicants registered for the fall term (48%).
