The top 6 out of 10 of California's largest wildfires in history have occurred this year!




#### **California stays showing out!**

The top map shows the coverage of fires across California this year! **Gray fires being past fires and red** fires being currently active.

The bottom map shows the dispersion of the smoke caused by the fires this year, specifically regarding the fires that took place in August, some of the most memorable smokey incidents we remember



This map represents the spread of the smoke that had been dispersed toward the end of Summer 2020. From lightest to most saturated, the colors represent highest air quality from the smoke to lowest air quality.

  - Fireworks are not worth the damage they can really cause in hot-dry environments.
    - Mowing your lawns can help decrease the risk of spread (not guarantee), in the case of a fire.
