What is Dual Enrollment?

- Opportunity for 9th-12th grade students to take college-level coursework while completing their high school diploma
- FREE for all high school students, up to 10 units per quarter (6 units in Summer)



Purpose


- Enhance the academic rigor of high school curriculum
- Provide a wider range of course offerings
- Help low-achieving students meet high academic standards and graduate from high school with college credit
- Ease college transition and improve college readiness
- Lead to job certification or associate degree
- Builds self-efficacy with underrepresented students

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AB 288 (CCAP) vs Non-AB 288

Highlights of AB 288 legislation:

- Expands dual-enrollment for students that may not be college bound or who are underrepresented in higher education
- Allowed to enroll in up to 15 units
- Allows closed courses on the high school campus
- Courses offered are part of a pathway
- Remedial courses can be offered
- Requires K12/CC board approved CCAP







 - 8% Pacific Islander
 - 2% Asian, Filipino, White, and American Indian
- **First-generation high school graduates:** 65%
- First-generation college-bound: 87%
