

## Foothill College Fall 2019 and Fall 2020 Census Enrollment Comparisons Report

From Fall 2019 and Fall 2020:

- Enrollment
  - Resident student enrollment is down 2%, Non-Resident student enrollment is down 21%.
  - Resident FTES is flat with 0% change, and Non-Resident FTES is down 22%.
  - Overall, student enrollment declined by 1,288, which is a 4% decrease.
  - Overall, estimated FTES decreased by 95, which is a 3% decrease.

- Fully Online Learning (Synchronous and Asynchronous)
  - Fully online learning estimated FTES is up 121% at 14,854.
  - Fully online learning headcount increased from 7,957 to 12,950.
  - Fully online learning enrollment is up 123% from 12,094 to 26,948.
  - Fully online learning sections offered increased from 353 to 916.

- International (F1) Students
  - Headcount among Fall 2020 F1/FC students is 490, a decline of 29% from Fall 2019 (686).
  - Male students continue to represent more than half of the F1/FC enrollment at 56% in Fall 2020 and Fall 2019.
  - China (F20: 178; F19: 252), Indonesia (F20: 36; F19: 43), and Taiwan (F20: 36; F19: 42) represent the top three place of origin in Fall 2020. Together these three nations represent 51% of F1/FC student enrollment in Fall 2020.
  
- Resident Students
  - Headcount among Fall 2020 resident students is 11,618, a decline of 3% from Fall 2019 (11,928).
  - AB540 headcount decreased by 15% from 434 in Fall 2019 to 368 in Fall 2020, reflecting in a 20% decrease in FTES est (F20: 101; F19: 127).

- Student Ethnicity Headcount and FTES
  - Headcount among White (-611), Asian (-355), and Latinx (-150) students declined between Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.
  - FTES est decreased the greatest among Asian (-12%) and White (-6%) students between Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.

- Student Ethnicity Headcount as Percent of Total Population
  - African American students increased by 1%-point from 5% to 6% of the total population.
  - White students decreased by 3%-points from 28% to 25% of the total population.

- Student Population Type
  - The largest increase in headcount (+223) and estimated FTES (+23) occurred among first-time students.
  - First-time transfer (-659) and Continuing (-233) students experienced a decrease in headcount from Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.

- Special Admit by Ethnicity
  - Asian special admits had the greatest increase in headcount from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020 (+92).
  - Latinx special admits had the greatest decrease in headcount from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020 (-89).
  - Overall, special admit headcount increased by 34 (3%), and their estimated FTES increased by 57 (28%).

- Student Ethnicity among First-Time New Students
  - Overall headcount among first-time new students increased by 233, along with an increase in FTES est by 23.
  - African American first-time new students increased in headcount by 165 from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020 (77 to 242).
  - Latinx first-time new students increased in headcount by 103 from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020 (462 to 565)
  - Decline to State, White, and Asian special admits decreased by 75 in headcount from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020.
  - Even though White special admits decreased in headcount (-16), their FTES est increased by 5%.

- Student Ethnicity among Continuing Students
  - Overall headcount among continuing students decreased by 4% (-233) between Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.
  - Headcount decrease occurred among all continuing student populations except Decline to State (+461) and Pacific Islander (+5).
  - The largest headcount decrease occurred among White (-329) and Asian (-225) continuing student populations.

- Zip Code Grouping
  - There was a greater decline in headcount from “Service Area: Cupertino, Sunnyvale, Santa Clara (part), San Jose (part), Saratoga (part)” (-523) compared to “Service Area: Los Altos, Los Altos Hills, Mountain View, Palo Alto, Stanford” (-431).
  - A decline in headcount from the remaining parts of Santa Clara County (-335) occurred between Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.
  - “Atherton, Belmont, East Palo Alto, Foster City, Menlo Park, Redwood City, San Carlos, San Mateo” had the largest decrease in headcount outside of the service area (-222).
  - Alameda County was one of the few zip code groupings that had an increase in headcount (+131) between Fall 2019 to Fall 2020.

- Zip Code Grouping as Percent of Total Headcount
  - As a percentage of total headcount, students from the service area decreased by 6%-points from 32% to 26%. Students from the service area represent one-fourth of the headcount for Fall 2020.
  - As a percentage of total headcount, students enrolled from Alameda County increased by 1%-point from Fall 2019 and Fall 2020.

- Zip Code Grouping within Santa Clara County among African Americans, Filipinx, Latinx
  - African American, Filipinx, and Latinx headcount declined from Fall 2019 and Fall 2020 (-246).
  - African American students experienced the greatest headcount decrease from “Service Area: Cupertino, Sunnyvale, Santa Clara (part), San Jose (part), Saratoga (part)” (-15, 45 to 30).
  - Latinx students experienced the greatest headcount decrease from “Service Area: Cupertino, Sunnyvale, Santa Clara (part), San Jose (part), Saratoga (part)” (-80, 383 to 303).
  - The percentage of African Americans who reside within Santa Clara County out of all African American enrollment decreased by 6%-points from 41% to 35%.
  - Half of the total Latinx student headcount is accounted by those residing within Santa Clara County (50%). This is a 4%-point decrease among Latinx students from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020.
  - Almost 60% of all Filipinx students reside within Santa Clara County compared to a little over one-third of all African Americans (35%).

- Headcount by County
  - While Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties had the highest enrollment by headcount, these two counties also had the largest decrease in headcount (-1,557) from Fall 2019 to Fall 2020.
  - Together Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties represent 67% of Fall 2020 headcount, a decrease of 7%-points from Fall 2019 (74%).
  - Alameda County had the largest headcount increase from 712 to 842 (+130).
