
Spring is Almost Here



The 2017 Scorecard was recently released by the State Chancellor's Office. The cohort data tracks first-time students who earned at least 6 units and attempted any Math or English in the first three years and achieved a degree, certificate or transfer outcome within six years. Foothill's degree/transfer completion rate continues to be stable and is higher than the State (63% versus 48%). While this is good news, we still have improvements to make in Math and English basic skills completion: 48% and 57% of those who start in basic skills complete a college-level Math and English course, respectively.

Transfer level achievement is a new addition to the scorecard. This measure looks at students who completed a transfer-level Math or English course in their second year. The English rate is 82% and is similar between ethnic groups. For Math, there is a significant gap in achievement between groups. The good news is the rate for Latino students increased from 36% in 2010-11 to 54% in 2014-15. Thank you to all who have worked to decrease the achievement gap!

While we are making progress, we still have a long way to go and I am confident we can completely close the gap. Our talented researcher **Lisa Ly** provided us with the analysis and chart below.
