RE: 2016-17 Umoja Community Survey Results

Overview

Students who participated in the Umoja Community for at least two terms during 2016-17¹ were surveyed at the end of Spring 2017 to determine their motivation, expectations, and satisfaction with the program. The survey was administered between June 19 and June 23, 2017. A total of 34 Umoja students were sent the online survey link and 3 students responded for a response rate of 9%.

Learned about Umoja

- 67% (2) selected “other” and specified they found out about Umoja from college track and instructor Samuel White.
- 33% (1) learned about Umoja from a flyer.

Motivation to Participate and Remain in Umoja

Respondents were asked what motivated them to **participate** in the Umoja Community and they could select up to three responses.

- Respondents cited they participated in Umoja because the program provides a built-in community and as well as peers whom respondents could identify with.

Respondents were also asked what motivated them to **remain enrolled** in the Umoja Community. As before, they could select up to three responses.

- There was no clear top motivator for remaining with Umoja.
- One respondent indicated having activities to learn more about four-year college was a motivator for participating in Umoja; however it was not selected as a motivator to remain in the program.

English Course Preparation

Respondents were asked whether the Umoja Community contributed to their ability to be successful in English, and they were prompted to elaborate on how Umoja has or has not helped them prepare for English courses at Foothill College.

- There was one response each for “yes”, “no” and “unsure.”
- The respondent who answered “no” explained the class was “*not strict,*” whereas the respondent who answered “yes” elaborated as follows: “*One of the initial courses I took*”


was African American Literature. With in learning this material, I also developed a deeper understanding of American Literature, one may have thought the two were mutually exclusive. While developing and correlation between the two materials, it also helped me understand several things. The African American contribution to American History which is not openly recognized. It helped me develop the confidence necessary to feel relevant within society, a voice. It also helped gain a deeper understanding of my own culture, such as were particular customs originated. It gave me the courage and foundation to own English.”

Counseling Drop-ins/Appointments

All respondents indicated they had met with their Umoja Community counselor, Tracee Cunningham. They were asked to identify how the drop-ins/appointments were helpful.

- 33% (2) felt it helped assess and track their class performance.
- 33% (2) felt like someone cared that they did well in school.
- 17% (1) felt it helped them stay focused on coursework.
- 17% (1) selected “other” and specified the drop-ins/appointments helped them develop an educational plan.

Student Learning Outcomes

Respondents were given a set of statements regarding the Umoja Community program, and asked to what extent do they agree or disagree with each statement.

- All respondents (3) agreed with the following statements:
 - Umoja values self-efficacy; it encourages respondents to believe in their abilities to complete tasks and reach their goals.
 - Umoja helped respondents become aware of their connectedness to the African and/or African America diaspora.
 - Umoja counselor, Tracee Cunningham helped respondents develop an educational plan.

- Two respondents agreed and one disagreed with the following statements:
 - Umoja encourages respondents to ask for help or seek out information when they do not understand something.
 - Umoja empowers respondents to actively participate in learning during and outside the class.
 - Umoja program helped respondents navigate college life at Foothill.
 - Umoja helped respondents communicate their authentic self.
 - Umoja encourage respondents to participate in leadership roles at Foothill.
- Two respondents agreed and one was unsure about whether they could implement the skills they learned in Umoja to other areas in their life.

Empowerment and Self-efficacy

Respondents were asked to provide examples of whether the Umoja Community helped them feel empowered or learn self-efficacy. Two respondents provided the following response:

- *"Some of the books we read really helped me understand why there are certain struggles we face."*
- *"Umoja helped me feel relevant to society."*

Program Expectations

Respondents were asked to think back to the beginning of the program and state what they hoped to gain or learn by participating in Umoja. Two respondents elaborated as follows:

- *"I hoped to gain long term friends."*
- *"I honestly wasn't sure what to expect."*

Respondents were then asked if their expectations were met. Two respondents elaborated as follows:

- *"Sort of. But a lot of the people in the program were boys. And being close to a boy in this society means I'm trying to get at them [sic] so not too close."*
- *"Exceeded. Not only has Umoja surrounded me with people who look like me and who care, but those who I would have never imagined. Those whom do not resemble my completion [sic] and care the same if not more."*


Recommendations & Improvements

Respondents were asked if they would recommend the Umoja Community to other students, and what improvements could be made to the program.

- 67% (2) would recommend Umoja Community to another student; one respondent was unsure and elaborated *"it was not amazing for me."*
- Respondents were asked what other course subjects they would like to see added to the program, and one respondent specified *"Math and Science."*
- Respondents indicated the following areas could be improved:
 - 33% (2) activities/events
 - 17% (1) course
 - 17% (1) mentoring

- 17% (1) gathering/study space
- 17% (1) selected “other” and requested book vouchers for entire course loads
